children they will meet. It costs just £400 to establish and run a choir in a Mumbai slum for one year and every penny raised will go directly towards helping to lift impoverished children out of the slums through giving them confidence, aspirations and an eagerness to learn.



Cambridge is well-known for the reputation of its choral music but this trip marks a departure from the tours normally undertaken by college choirs.

This is an opportunity for Cambridge students to make a difference through their musicmaking. We may often forget what an enormous privilege it is to live and work in this beautiful city, enjoying all its cultural riches, but for the children of the Mumbai slums, the opportunity to sing and work together towards a performance is something that is far from ordinary.

We are sure that the experience will be profoundly important and moving for both the students and the children they will work with. During this tour the Choir will travel into some of the most deprived areas of Mumbai and perform for the children before leading workshops and teaching the children songs and singing techniques that the group hopes they will remember for the rest of their lives.

The ultimate goal of the project is to build up a relationship between the College and the choirs run by Songbound.

The hope remains that, one day, some of the children will be able to come to the UK to perform alongside Jesus College Choir, raising the profile of an important worth-while charity, which does extremely valuable work with children who have very little else in their lives to give them hope.

Pastry Chef Mat Harrison travels to the home of a culinary legend

The college has always encouraged employees to better themselves, none more so than the Catering Department. This is mainly to keep up with the ever changing food trends and styles, so I was most pleased to take part in a week's work placement between 28th January and 1st February 2013, at *Le Manoir Aux Quat Saisons*, home of the iconic Raymond Blanc!

Le Manoir is seven miles from Thame, close to Oxford and is set in magnificent grounds with old stone buildings comprising of 32 suites, all having been personally designed by Monsieur Blanc and his team – the most luxurious being a wallet-bending £1200.00 a night!!!





As you might expect, most kitchens are comprised of three sections (starters, main course and desserts) and this was no different. I worked solely on the Pastry section, which included sub sections – front and back (front looking after the desserts for lunch and dinner, and back for all breads, pastries and petit fours)

Most of the desserts had several elements to them, some having to be made days in advance and throughout the week, I had a hand in making everything including a garnish of jellified Lemongrass foam, Tart Almondine, Lemon and Basil Sorbet, Caramel Ice Cream, Eight different types of Bread Rolls and some extremely delicate petit fours, complete with Gold Leaf (of course!!)



Having gained 25 years' experience in the industry, I felt at ease with any task I was given and enjoyed working with this great team of chefs (8 in total, in a relatively small space)

A Curious Story About Château d'Yquem

Catering Functions Supervisor Homero Cabaco tells all

Not being a great connoisseur of wines, my association with this superb dessert wine only happened because of my job in catering.

Château d'Yquem is, I learned at some stage in my career, produced in the sauternes region in France and made from the semillon (80%) and sauvignon (20%) grapes.

Later in the year, after a long summer the grapes are "attacked" or infected by a fungus - botrytis cinerea - which the English call noble rot. In the harvest (which takes place in the late September), the raisin-like grapes are picked individually, ensuring that only the ripest are used in the production of this unique wine.

Some thirty years ago an eminent master of one of the colleges in Cambridge retired. The governing body of the college decided that a

banquet should take place. There was however a slight problem; the departure of the master had been unexpected and therefore money for the dinner was not available or had not been budgeted for. Somebody then remembered that in the well-stocked college cellars lay a considerable amount of Château d'Yquem, which the college had bought in 1936 for 50p a bottle.

They arranged to send some of this wine to Sotheby's in London for auction. It was a success! The wine reached £900 per case and not only was there enough money to pay for the magnificent 300 covers feast, but there was enough so that Château d'Yquem was also included on the menu to be served with dessert.

As I write these lines I can't help but recollect, with some nostalgia, having had that night a surreptitious drop of that wonderful! nectar, (feeling in the mouth its concentration, complexity, sweetness and longevity...) this has prevailed, in my memories of a long career in service, as one of a very few "moments of glory." I sincerely doubt, with the modern policy of keeping stocks to a minimum and the high value of Château d'Yquem, that a story like this will happen again.

P.S: In July 2011, an 1811 bottle of Château d'Yquem sold for £75,000 at The Ritz in London to a private collector, to become the most expensive bottle of wine ever sold!



Connecting Through Science

Helping to inspire scientific innovation for future generations

Pictured below is the Master at the formal opening of the Cambridge Science Centre at 18 Jesus Lane (situated in the space formally known as 'The Shop.') The Science Centre was officially opened by Professor Sir Leszek Borysiewicz, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge on 7th February 2013 (also pictured below.)

The Science Centre is an educational charity which is now open for business and is guided by three main principles; to develop and host exhibitions and events, to enhance public understanding relating to scientific progress, and to deliver targetted outreach exhibitions which will improve access for underserved communities around Cambridgeshire and East Anglia. Jesus College is one of several official supporters amongst many companies and organisations, including the British Science Association.

The Centre is currently hosting several exhibitions, including Light and Colour which investigates the spectrum of light which can be detected by the human eye, Inside DNA, looking at the relationship between apes and humans, and an exhibit which explores how Electromagnetic Power supplies enough energy to support all of our gadgets within the modern world.

All of these exhibitions are currently open to both schools and members of the public, and are expected to run until July 2013 (pre-booking may not always be necessary!)
