I was talking recently to a senior member of the College about what it meant to say that the Chapel is 'at the heart of the College'. It is surrounded by the College buildings,

its bell rings and people walk through the cloisters all the time. Even those who seldom go in know where it is. Open to everyone, whatever their beliefs, it is there that a universal concern for the College and the world finds Christian expression every day in Morning and Evening Prayer, as laid down by statute. But we also agreed that the Chapel, like a parish church, is simply there, and if there were some threat to its fabric or existence, there would be a sense of loss and shock.

We can also turn the question round and ask who is at the heart of the Chapel. As well as services and their preparation by the Chapel Clerks and Secretaries, a lot happens in the Chapel: there is the music, especially the Choir, but also the people who look after the Chapel. I've had contact with almost every department, and one morning in the Chapel I happened to meet the Carpenter, the Electrician, the Maintenance Manager, the Domestic Bursar, the scaffolder, the Director of Music and the Chapel Administrator, all there attending to different things. Someone was probably practising the organ too!

This term the windows on the south side of the nave and transept have been restored and the roof repaired. The Chapel is always cleaned, but this was much more difficult while the works were going on, and everything was specially cleaned and polished in the few days between the scaffolding coming down and the Commemoration of Benefactors. We are grateful to everyone whose activities ensure the Chapel can be a place of beauty and calm for the whole College.
