RULES.

- 1. The Society shall be composed of matriculated Members of Jesus College, Cambridge, and be called "THE JESUS COLLEGE CAMBRIDGE SOCIETY."
 - 2. The objects of the Society shall be :-
 - (a) To encourage intercourse between old Jesus men, and to keep them in touch with the College and its doings,
 - (b) To publish and circulate amongst its Members an Annual Report, containing a list of Members with their addresses, and all news of interest about the doings of the present and former Members of the College.
 - (c) To ensure the permanence and success of the Jesus College Dinner, held annually in London on the first day of the Inter-University Cricket Match, and to pay the incidental expenses thereof.
 - (d) To forward the interests of any College institution.

- 3. Every matriculated Member of the College shall be eligible for election to the Society, and upon election and payment of one guinea shall become a Member of the Society, without being liable to any further expense.
- 4. The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. The Master of the College shall be the President. In the event of a Vice-Master of the College being appointed, he shall become Vice-President. The Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting.
- 5. The management of the Society and the election of Members shall be vested in a Committee, consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, two resident Fellows of the College nominated from time to time by the Master and Fellows, and sixteen elected Members. At the Annual General Meeting one-fourth of the elected Members of the Committee shall retire from office. The retiring Members shall be those who have been longest in office since their last election, and amongst those of equal seniority the choice, in default of agreement, shall be made by ballot. The vacancies so created shall be filled up at the same Meeting by a majority of the votes of those present and voting. Casual vacancies may be filled up by the Committee, subject to confirmation at the next Annual General Meeting. A Member elected to fill a casual vacancy shall retire at the time when the Member whose place he fills would have retired.

- 6. The administration of the funds of the Society shall be vested in the Committee, who may invest or otherwise deal with the same for the objects of the Society as they in their discretion may think fit. All investments shall be made in the names of three Trustees to be appointed by the Committee.
- 7. The Committee shall meet as and when they may from time to time determine; five to form a quorum.
- 8. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held in London or Cambridge on a day to be fixed by the Committee. At least fourteen days' notice of the Meeting shall be given by the Secretary in such manner as the Committee shall from time to time direct.
- 9. The Annual Report, containing a list of Members with their addresses, and all news of interest about the doings of the present and former Members of the College, shall be edited by the two resident Fellows who are Members of the Committee, in conjunction with the Secretary, and shall be sent to every Member of the Society.
- Io. The Committee in their discretion may, and, upon a written request signed by fifteen Members of the Society, shall call a Special General Meeting, the time and place for which shall be determined by the Committee. At least fourteen days' notice of such Meeting, stating the subject, shall be given in such manner as the Committee may direct.

12. The Rules of the Society may be altered, but no alteration shall be made except at a General Meeting and by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting, and unless notice of the proposed alteration has been stated on the notice calling the Meeting.

REPORT OF THE EVENTS OF THE YEAR

1911-1912.

These first few lines are written with the last piece of news which the report of the College for 1911-12 will contain. The May races are over and the Jesus crew, after bumping Pembroke somewhat easily the first night, overlapping I. Trinity the second, and fleeing in some terror away from a fast III. Trinity crew the third, pulled themselves together on the last night and defeated I. Trinity in the Long Reach, thus going once more Head of the River. The rowing was of the rough and ready order; three men had never rowed before last October, the men were never properly together, but as everyone plugged in his own fashion as hard as he could, they got the boat along somehow and won the coveted position by sheer pluck and doggedness. Unfortunately, Mr. Steve Fairbairn was only able to take them the first two days of term, and they had not the advantage of much coaching till the end, or they would have been a crew of outstanding merit. As it is, they have much to learn yet; but next year with six men of the present crew the Jesus boat should be one worthy of the best traditions of the College.

The light blue flag was hoisted with the red and black by Mr. P. M. Thornton, and the Master saw them go up as he sat in his carriage. It is a great happiness for all Jesus men to think that he still takes the keenest interest in the welfare of the College. The second boat made three bumps and was somewhat unlucky in not making four, and Jesus has now two boats in the first seven—a thing unprecedented in our rowing annals. First Trinity in its palmy days had two boats in the first three, and this should be the aim of our Boat Club to attain. It is possible, but hardly conceivable, in 1913.

If reviewers are to be believed the volume of Jesus essays entitled The Parting of the Roads, has attained a marked success in the theological world, Curiously enough, excluding the Editor, who may be considered as the coach, the essayists are eight members of the College steered by an Honorary and recent Professorial Fellow, Dr. Inge; the Dean of St. Paul's being, like Mr. Skinner, who steered the first boat, the most useful member of the whole crew. The volume has received the highest commendation from the Athenæum, the Morning Post, the Westminster Review and the Times, and the sort of praise from the Guardian which a successful Jesus crew receives from the arbiters of the rowing world, that "praise with faint damns" which is praise indeed. The Expository Times devotes seven columns to an appreciative criticism, the Athenæum a page, and the Times two columns of its literary supplement. The last named review is written by an Oxford scholar of known eminence. He singles out for especial commendation Dr. Oesterley, Mr. H. G. Wood and Mr. B. T. D. Smith. The two latter essays he pronounces to be of "outstanding importance" and the whole work one of real importance. That a single College should have provided men to produce such a work is matter for congratulation, and the attempt successfully made is absolutely unprecedented in any older English University.

The following statistics show that in point of numbers the College continues to flourish. In October last, with an entry of seventy-one freshmen, the number of men in statu pupillari stood at two hundred and eleven, six less than in the preceding October. But counting those only who are in residence this term, the freshmen number seventy-one, the second year sixty-nine, the third year fifty, the fourth year undergraduates three; there are eight B.A.'s, and twenty-one Jesus men above that degree reside in Cambridge as members of the electoral roll, in addition to five residents who are not on the roll. Thus the total number of persons in statu pupillari is two hundred and one as compared with one hundred and ninety-nine, the figure in the May Term of 1911.

Our Obituary List, happily shorter than has been the case in recent *Reports*, includes one of the oldest and one of the youngest members of the College. The death of Alan Wright, Scholar of the College, took place on June 15th, 1911, He and a friend, also a Cambridge undergraduate, were drowned while bathing on the coast of Norfolk. The news preceded by one day the announcement that he had obtained a second class in the Historical Tripos.

Robert MacMillan Dunlop, of the Danes' Hill, Hertford, died at Leeds on 4th September, 1911, aged 54. About a year after East House was left vacant by the death of the late Dean, Mr. Dunlop, leaving his former home in the north at Windermere, returned to his old College as tenant of East House. Shrewd in business.

matters, a keen sportsman, and the most genial of hosts, he lived during the ten years or more of his residence here in the friendliest relations with the Master and Fellows, and made not a few acquaintances among some of the leading undergraduates. Genuine regret was felt when he decided some years ago to remove to another residence near Hertford, where his Cambridge friends were always sure of a hearty welcome. His premature death which followed on an operation, came as a great grief last autumn to his many friends.

The Rev. Arthur Lewis Babington Peile, C.V.O.. died in London, 19th September, 1911, aged 81. He was educated at Eton, and took his degree here in 1852. In 1862 he became Vicar of Holy Trinity, Ventnor, where he worked for 27 years, and was then appointed by Queen Victoria to the Mastership of the Royal Collegiate Hospital of St. Katharine, Regent's Park. He was the first President of the Queen Victoria Jubilee Justitute for Nurses. An Honorary Chaplain to three successive Sovereigns, he was created a C.V.O. in 1908.

The Rev. Henry Homer died on 17th October, 1911, within a few days of completing his 92nd year. He came up to Cambridge from Rugby School, which he had entered under Dr. Arnold's predecessor. At Jesus he was a Rustat Scholar, and took his degree in 1843. Steaduly refusing preferment, he was Curate-in-Charge at Barlestone, Leicestershire, for nearly fifty years, returning in 1900 to his native place, Rugby. He was a generous contributor to Church institutions in the town, and by his will has left a legacy of one hundred pounds to the Masters and Fellows of Jesus, to be used for College purposes.

The Rev. Henry Bodley Bromby, Honorary Canon of Bristol, died on December 20th, 1911, aged 71. Canon Bromby was a Rustat Scholar of the College, and took his degree in 1864. Ordained in the same year, he went out to Tasmania, of which his father had recently become the Bishop, as Curate of the Cathedral at Hobart. He was Dean of Hobart from 1877 to 1884, when he returned to England, and shortly afterwards became Vicar of St. John, Bethnal Green. From 1892 onwards he was Vicar of All Saints', Clifton, until he resigned in the early part of last year.

Fellowships. In the October term, G. G. Morris, B.A., Scholar of Trinity College, was elected to a Research Fellowship for three years. At Eton, Mr. Morris was Newcastle scholar, and his University career has been distinguished, his honours including the Charles Oldham Classical Scholarship, the Browne Medals in 1908 and 1909, and the Winchester Reading Prize in 1910; he was placed in Class I., Division I., of the Classical Tripos, Part I., in 1909, and in Class I. (with distinction, of Part II., of the same Tripos (Section A), in 1911. The subject of his research is the early English Drama.

In the same term the list of Honorary Fellows was increased by the name of Dr. Inge, Dean of St. Paul's, and more recently the College shewed its appreciation of the eminence of Mr. Charles Whibley in literature by electing him also to an Honorary Fellowship,

The approaching departure from Cambridge of another of our Honorary Fellows, Dr. A. J. Mason, Master of Pembroke, is universally regretted. Steps are

being taken to secure a portrait of him to be hung in the Hall of that College, with which he has been associated as Master.

Mr. Howard, who has been an ideal Chaplain of the College, is now about to leave us and take up missionary work in India, which has all along been his ultimate intention. He takes with him the regrets and good wishes of every member of the College. His successor is the Rev. H. E. Wynn, B.A., who joined this College from Trinity Hall as a Lady Kay Theological scholar.

College The College living of Tewin, vacant by the Livings. resignation of the Rev. Professor Nairne, has been accepted by the Rev. A. C. Vidler, Vicar of Swavesey; and the Rev. J. S. Sharp, formerly scholar of the College, has been elected to the Vicarage of Swavesey.

Honours. In 1911, First Classes were obtained in the various Triposes as follows: Mathematical Tripos, Part II., Wrangler, H. S. Jones, b*, with special distinction in Schedule B.: Part I., C. E. Jones; Classical, Part II., E. M. W. Tillyard; Part I., M. L. W. Laistner, in the third division; Natural Sciences, Part II., H. L. Cronk; Theological, Part II., P. Gardner-Smith, B.A.; H. E. Wynn, B.A., who was awarded the Evans Prize for Church History; Law, Part II. O. W. Darch, Part I., J. S. C. Reid.

E. M. W. Tillyard, B.A., has been elected to the Craven Studentship, and H. S. Jones, B.A. to the Isaac Newton Studentship. A. E. Aldous was mentioned as distinguished in the examination for the Bell Scholarships.

On the results of the College Examinations in June, 1911, E. M. Aron and H. B. Sålmon were elected Scholars.

A Lady Kay Theological Scholarship was awarded to W. M. Peacock.

Degrees. In the course of the year B. K. Nutman, M.B., has proceeded to the degree of M.D. L'Up to the present time of writing eighteen members of the College have taken their M.A. degrees.

The Vice-Master has been appointed to examine for the Charles Oldham Shakespeare Scholarships, and Mr. Abbott examined for the Bell Scholarships. Books. Memorial The medallion portrait of Cranmer, executed by Mr. Bruce Joy, is to be set up in the South Cranmer. Transept of the Chapel, and will be unveiled by the Visitor of the College, the Bishop of Ely, at a Service to be held on June 13th. It is hoped that the Master of Pembroke and the Dean of St. Paul's will take part in the proceedings.

The rooms, reputed to have been inhabited by Coleridge, at the bottom of staircase D, have recently been converted into a Library and Reading Room auxiliary to the College Library. It will be known as the Shield Library in commemoration of the fact that the money for the alterations and fittings has been largely drawn from a bequest left to the College by the late Bursar, Mr. Hugh Shield.

The recent bequest of the Rev. Henry Homer will probably be devoted to some improvement in the decoration of the East end of the Chapel.

Electric light will, it is expected, be installed throughout the College in the course of the coming Long Vacation.

Rowing. Last year's Report dealt with the then recent May races in which our three boats finished third, tenth, and twenty-eighth on the river.

It was decided that the Old Jesus Eight, which defeated the Belgians, should enter for the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley. Unfortunately, two of the crew (H. M. Goldsmith and H. C. Hudson) were unable to row, so J. H. Goldsmith and L. A. Pattinson were taken from the May Boat as substitutes. This weakened the May Boat considerably, and as several people crocked

just before the races, the crew was never able to get properly together. Jesus drew First Trinity in the first round of the Thames Cup, and were beaten fairly easily.

The Old Jesus Eight was again coached by S. M. Bruce, the old Trinity Hall blue, who had coached them for their race against the Belgians. They entered for the Grand, and drew a bye the first day. The next day they met Thames R.C., and had no difficulty. In the semifinals they met London R.C. This was not such an easy race; but, although London stuck to it gamely to the end, Jesus never looked like losing, and won fairly comfortably. The race with Magdalen College, Oxford, in the final, was a great deal closer than would appear from the official verdict. Jesus led by a quarter of a length at the end of the Island, and kept the lead to Fawley. From this point Magdalen went away, and eventually won by 21 lengths. Their victory was undoubtedly due to their greater weight, and perhaps also to greater racing experience. The Magdalen eight was generally admitted to be one of the finest crews ever seen at Henley.

The light four came up early in October and began practice at once. The order was:—

J. Simson (bow & steers)

2 L. A. Pattinson

3 J. H. Goldsmith

J. H. Jerwood (stroke)

S. Fairbairn came up on one or two days at the beginning of term and coached the crew. They were then taken in hand by H. J. Shields, later by S. E. Swann, the Trinity Hall Blue, and finally by C. A. Skinner. About a week before the races Goldsmith had the misfortune to strain himself, and it was thought at the time that he might not be able to row. However, he was only absent for a day. Added to this, Simson was suffering from blood poisoning; but the climax came two days before the races, when Jerwood crocked. It seemed to be predestined that the four should not row. After serious consideration, however it was decided that the crew should not scratch, but that Pattinson should be moved to stroke, and S. T. Gray called in at 2.

Jesus had drawn First Trinity in the second round, both crews having had byes the day before. Our four almost held its own over the first part of the course, and at the Plough was only about a length down. But from this point First Trinity gradually went up, and eventually won by about sixty-five yards. Jesus stuck to it to the end, but the result was only to be expected. The most remarkable feature of the race was Pattinson's spurt after the Railway Bridge, which gained about two lengths.

The only Jesus representative in the Colquboun Sculls was L. A. Pattinson. It will be remembered that he was beaten in the semi-final last year by half a second by S. E. Swann, the ultimate winner. In the first round he beat C. F. Burnand, the First Trinity blue, and in the second round H. T. Day (L.M.B.C.). In the final he met R. W. M. Arbuthnot, the 'Varsity President. Although in the preceding heats Pattinson had done considerably

faster times than his opponent, the result of this race was doubtful, as while Pattinson had had two gruelling races, the President had never been fully extended. In addition, the wind, which on the two previous occasions had been "head," now changed right round, and became "following," which favoured Arbuthnot. On setting out for the starting point, Pattinson had a piece of very bad luck. Apparently the guard of his left swivel had not been properly fastened, and when holding up his boat his scull slipped out, and he upset. Many thought that this would materially affect his chances, but although he had to borrow dry clothes, and it took him some time to get circulation back, it did not seem to make much difference to his sculling.

Both scullers got off well, and at the Ditch Pattinson seemed to be about a length up. This was increased to two or three lengths at the Plough. In the Reach Arbuthnot made valiant attempts to draw level, but Pattinson, sculling strongly, with a sound leg drive and a hard finish, kept the lead and won by about two lengths. The time, which was 7 min. 52 secs., was exceedingly fast, only 6 secs. over record. Pattinson sculled with great determination, and thoroughly deserved his win. Arbuthnot also sculled well and pluckily.

We had three representatives in the 'Varsity Trials, J. H. Goldsmith and J. C. Holmes at 3 in their respective boats, and L. E. Ridley as cox.

The winning boat in the College Trials was stroked by H. Burnaby. H. D. B. Harford and G. Davy won the Farquharson Pairs; J. C. Holmes the College Sculls; and H. Baillieu the Freshmen's Sculls.

In the Lent Term the first two boats came up a week early, and immediately began going out twice daily. As was anticipated by the authorities, it was soon seen that there was plenty of material for a good boat, though it combined rather too much crudeness with its strength. After trying Burnaby, Atkin and Simson at stroke, Fairbairn was at last tried, and it became evident that he was the man for that position. What would have been the ultimate order of the boat was then settled upon, had it not suffered from illness, in conjunction with most other athletic clubs. It may be mentioned here that Holmes and Simson, the only May colours eligible for the Lents, were both prevented from taking part in them by illness, the latter crocking only two days before the races started. When Holmes disappeared, Baillieu went 7, and Fisher was moved up from the second boat. Steve Fairbairn put in an appearance about a fortnight before the races, and, as usual, improved the boat marvellously.

Our troubles, however, were not over: bow and 7 had to rest for a few days, and consequently the boat had to go out with two substitutes. Both boats suffered two days before the races, as Gould, who had been rowing 4 in the second boat, had to take Simson's place at 6 in the first. It can hardly be said that they were well together, but occasionally they hit it off and drove their blades through well.

Contrary to expectation, Lady Margaret made no impression on us at first, in fact we had gained about half-a-length by the Gut, and increased the distance till at Ditton we were two-and-half lengths clear. Lady Margaret fell victims to First in the Long Reach, and our

boat paddled over the rest of the way easily. On the second day, we again led. After rounding Grassy with two lengths separating the boats, we let the stroke down a little. This was due to the general inexperience of the men who had not raced before. We may mention that there were four freshmen in the boat, and one second-year man who had not rowed at all before last term. First kept their stroke going, and, rowing about five strokes a minute faster, gradually wore us down until we had to acknowledge defeat at the Railway Bridge.

On the Friday we determined to risk nothing, and prepared to go over the whole course. It is not usual for a Jesus boat to rush another. We generally reckon to make a bump somewhere towards the end of the Reach, if at all. So on Friday, after getting an excellent start, we soon settled down to a long steady stroke. As a matter of fact, we went up from the very start, and gained ground with every stroke. Round Grassy about three-quarters of a length separated the boats. This was diminished all along the Plough Reach, till at Ditton there was very little daylight between the boats. We continued to go up, and just round Ditton Ridley found no difficulty in steering well into the Trinity boat. The rowing on this occasion was really excellent. Perhaps we may here point out this as an example of how much better men row when they settle down to a long steady stroke, than when anything in the nature of a "hustle" is introduced.

On the last day we got away to a fair start, and at Grassy were two or three yards outside our starting distance. After rounding the corner, however, First came up considerably. Opposite the Plough little more

than three-quarters of a length separated the boats. The Trinity men were unable to improve on this. We took our boat into Ditton well, and when the corner had been negotiated found we had regained our starting distance, which we maintained to the finish, rowing at a slightly slower stroke all down the Reach.

The second and third boats made three bumps each. They would probably have got their oars had they not started with good boats in front of them.

Queens', starting in front of the second boat, found great difficulty in evading being bumped, especially at Ditton, where but a few feet saved them. They ultimately succeeded in getting over, though if the second boat had not been weakened during the last week by having to give up two men to the first boat, it is more than probable that Queens' would have been caught.

On Thursday the second boat lowered the colours of Pembroke II. at Ditton, and on the third day bumped Lady Margaret II. without difficulty. On the Saturday Clare I. had to submit, so we are given to understand, somewhere near the little bridge. This must be nearly a record for a First Division boat.

The third boat had bad luck in starting behind Downing, which ascended six places. There was not much to choose between the boats, as we were hardly outside our starting distance from Downing when the latter made their over-bump. On the three following days the third boat found making bumps quite easy. They did not have to row beyond the Gut. Their victories were Hall III., Selwyn II. and Emmanuel III.
